Boys finish 3 points down at buzzer despite having lead with seconds to play

On Wednesday 6 June the U13 boys basketball team travelled down to PCSA in Weston to face new opposition. The U13 boys have had lots of matches this year but many of them have been against Gordano School. Priory fielded a team of mixed age and gender but a good number of the players were older than our boys which gave them a fantastic opportunity to test themselves on the basketball court. In typical St Katherine's style a good number of the boys went out determined to find their best during the match and the final outcome was really pleasing!

From the outset it was clear that the boys were going to find the going tough physically but that there would be an opportunity for them to make up the difference with their understanding of the game and their skill level. The SK boys had more game experience but the Priory team had the edge in terms of strength, speed and height. It was a really interesting battle and SK quickly learned that they would have to be really accurate if they wanted to finish on top. In the first quarter of the game SK were wholly dominant with their quality at the basket. They quickly went out to 10 points leaving their opponents down at the first break. Toby, Ben and Najib added the points while Ben seemed to make it his mission to balance out the physical differences between the two sides.

The boys' confidence grew after their positive start to the game and they began to handle the ball a little too much. The PCSA team were reaching in for the ball which meant that the SK boys could easily beat the first man but after getting by they continued to dribble instead of letting the pass go which just gifted their opposition the turnover after being smothered out. It took the boys a long time to learn from their mistakes and throughout the entire second period they added no points to their tally. Priory enjoyed their own period of dominance and managed to overturn the points difference and build a lead of their own.

SK went on a run of their own in the third period which saw key players Toby and Ben link up in search of the lead once more. Ben Lumoso was on fire during the third and scored 11 points solo with some superb ball handling, accurate jump shots and also the confidence to drive to the hoop in heavy traffic and draw the contact. Ben didn't just draw the fouls; he made them pay too and was 75% from the stripe sinking 3 of his 4 free shots. Other boys like Toby, Joe and Daud grew into the game and began to work out the secret to overcoming the superior athleticism of the Priory team. Priory gained confidence as the game wore on and so the result was clearly to be decided in the last period.

SK continued to play smart basketball – one basket in particular stood out as the boys showed great patience on the perimeter by setting up and executing their motion offence. Ben drove to the basket but was forced low under the hoop before spotting that Jon had made an excellent cut to the basket. Ben found him with the pass and Jon made the shot for a neat 2 point move. In fact Ben's passing was sublime in the final period as he really gave the Priory team a defensive workout. With less than 60 seconds to play SK had a point lead and possession of the ball. Earlier in the game SK had turned over and worked to re-establish possession 4 times in the space of about 30 seconds and this had cost them. The same happened again in the dying seconds of the game as Priory got hold of the ball and made a 2 point effort with around 15 seconds on the clock. Unfortunately some of the SK boys had resigned themselves to defeat at this point and weren't even watching as Toby was desperate to inbound the ball. Toby launched the ball back into play into Ben's hands and set off up the court like a rocket. Ben recognised the need to play with urgency and passed the ball on again to a team mate. By this point Toby was clear through to the basket and would have had a match winning shot had he been found with the pass. Unfortunately PCSA smothered the ball and managed to get away a buzzer beating shot of their own to finish with 32 points to SK's 29. A valiant effort from a talented group of young players – MVP Ben Lumoso. Great to see so many stepping up in a tough contest!

Churchill won the toss for the first game and elected to bat first – never a bad decision to get runs on the board in limited overs cricket. Alex picked up a wicket in his first over which made the start to the game really interesting but the boys were acutely aware that Churchill's danger man was still at the crease. Will Conroy was absolutely delighted when Alex held onto the catch that dismissed him in the second over of the game for just 6 runs. Will went on to be the pick of the bowlers taking the only two wickets and being the most economical. However a few too many extras (17) meant that Churchill finished on a very competitive 71 from their 8.

Kaie and Ethan opened the batting but found it difficult to get going as quickly as they would have liked. They were never miles behind the rate but always just short which was always going to make things tricky at the back end of the innings. After Ethan was dismissed Alex came to the crease and added 20 more runs from just 11 deliveries – a feat that he would repeat on multiple occasions during the afternoon. Some of Alex's hitting was brutal but this was only just the start. Unfortunately the boys were 7 runs short at the end and also lost 4 wickets in the final over.

In their second match the boys faced Gordano and knew they were in for a tough game. Gordano won the toss and put us in to bat which we didn't mind, having batted reasonably well in the first game. Recognising the importance of getting early runs the boys decided to move some of their more destructive game changing hitters up the order to see if they came off. In 8 over matches you stand very little chance of coming back in so may as well try and get your runs as quickly

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as you can and give others the chance to come in and do the same. Alex and Eli opened up and both retired in quick fashion; Eli with 22 from 16 deliveries and 14 boundary runs, Alex with 20 from 9 deliveries and 16 boundary runs. Boys added 20 runs to their tally from the 7th over but could only manage 8 in the last despite Ethan coming in to smash 18 from just 6 balls 3 of which were boundaries. The boys were confident with their total of 79.

Things weren't looking good for Gordano when they lost their big hitting opener for 10 from just 9 – Alex Wilson picking him up bowled. Gordano mounted a steady resurgence that bought them back into the game but again extras (15) proved costly. A Gordano left handed bat came in for the final over needing 12 for victory and after he smashed two fours off of his legs the boys were struggling to see how they could stop their opponents from chasing down the total. A dramatic run out from Alex Wilson after the Gordano boys pushed for a 2 that wasn't there changed the course of the game and put SK back in the driving seat. Needing just 2 runs from 2 balls Gordano played sensibly to tie the game first off of the penultimate delivery. Alex was frustrated that they had managed to run through a leg bye and so headed back for his mark breathing fire. Little surprise then that a wicket came from his last to ensure the boys got the tie they richly deserved and he wound up pick of the bowlers too – a great game of close entertaining cricket.



The boys faced Backwell in their third match, a game which they won by 3 runs. The boys stuck with their tactics of putting their power hitters in up the order and they delivered in style! Alex retired with 21 in just 5 balls including 2 fours and 2 sixes! In a phenomenal hitting display Alex bowed out with a strike rate of 420 and put his team well and truly in the driving seat. Ethan and Eli both added runs and the boys found themselves on 51 after just 5 overs! Unfortunately the final 2 overs were disappointing and they could only add 7 more to their total – they found that frustrating and were determined to set about defending a total they were not satisfied with given their foundations.

Pick of the bowlers in this game was Alfie Rendell who bowled out with figures of 12-2 off of his 3. It was a great piece of captaincy from Will to bowl Alfie out when he was going so well. Alex, Louie and Will complimented Alfie well to ensure that the boys had their first victory of the afternoon! As much as the boys were pleased to have a win they still conceded too many extras (14) and were determined to put that right in their final match.

All good batting sides will eventually fail to come off but it was fairly unique in their last game that so many of the boys came and went cheaply. The only boy who hung around to collect any runs was Eli who made 14 from as many balls. Louie and Kaie added some to the total towards the back end of the innings but they knew that their 50 was going to be tricky to defend. The boys varied their bowling superbly and the constant change in attack causes the Clevedon boys some serious problems as they struggled to make their way to the target. Had it not been for their keeper coming in and retiring in just 11 deliveries they would have been short. Pleasingly the boys conceded far fewer extras (4) in this game - Henil, Logan, Alfie and Will conceding none at all!



All up the boys had 1 victory, 1 tie and two loses but played the game in an excellent spirit; competitively and fairly. There were some fantastic performances throughout the afternoon. Ethan Eggleston was the standout fielder of the day – his ground work was exceptional and he was a constant energiser in the field encouraging boys to back up and get around at every opportunity. Special mention has to go to Alex Wilson for a superb all round cricketing performance. Alex's batting

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was brutal and yet another example of some of the cleanest ball striking I have seen for a long time and he wasn't bad with the ball either! Just in case you were thinking that he might not be the complete cricketer, Alex pulled on the keeping gloves for the last game and held an outstanding caught behind, 1 handed full length on the dive!

AVON SCHOOLS TRACK & FIELD

Trio of talented athletes represent district at outdoor athletics championships

On Saturday 9 June three students from St Katherine's represented North Somerset at the Avon Schools Outdoor Track and Field Championships against teams from Bristol, South Gloucestershire and BANES. Jazper Peacey, Finley King and Ashya Gray were all selected due to their performances in the North Somerset Championships earlier this year. All three of these students have set new school records this year in their respective events and so were really excited about the prospect of competing at this higher level. Jazper ran 1500m in 5.03, Finley King cleared 1.55 in the high jump and Ashya has gone out to 5.50 in the long jump!



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Finley has been jumping really well in practice and in actual fact cleared 1.52 comfortably just the evening before the competition itself. Finley kicked proceedings off in the high jump and must have felt his nerves dissipate when he cleared his selected opening height of 1.35. From there Finley looked good and made his way over 1.45 easily. Although Finley has cleared 1.55 in practice, he has never gone above 1.45 in competition and unfortunately for him the same remained true again in this event. Finley should be enormously proud of his achievement this year, especially considering that he does not compete or train regularly at an athletics club – something he should definitely be looking to change!

Next up was Ashya Gray who enjoyed a stellar indoor season. Ashya jumped 5.49 at the NS competition but put in one huge jump that would have seen him getting close to 6 metres had it not been for a minute overstep. I have absolute confidence that Ashya has a 6 metre jump in him and just needs to put it all together to see the magic happen. Ashya jumped really well on the morning but could only manage 5.48 as his best. Frustratingly for him, had he been able to equal his school record of 5.50 he would have finished in the top three but he was short by the 2cm.

Jazper is back to full fitness and firing on all cylinders this year and his hard work and dedication in the boxing gym shown to be paying dividends this year when he ran a superb 1500m at the NS Championships setting a new school record of 5.03. At this meet Jazper was running against some serious competition and one of the runners was pacing himself for 4.20 – the English Schools qualifying standard time. Jazper ran a gutsy race to finish in a new school record time of 5.02 – a time that he should be really proud of!



I am really proud of these three boys for the way that they competed at Avon Schools – all three have huge athletic talent and potential. On the Thursday evening before the meet I stood on stage at the Sports Awards and talked about how the sign of a great competitor is being able to produce the goods when the pressure is highest. These three boys did exactly that, Finley jumped as high as he has ever gone in a big competition, Ashya was just 2cm off his PB and Jazper ran a new PB and school record – you can't ask for more than that!

Congratulations on your selection for this event gents and well done for your efforts.



On Wednesday 13 June the U13 boys basketball team travelled to Clevedon School for a friendly basketball match against more new opponents. In fact those same four boys had a cricket match for Lodway in the evening and so were pretty much playing sport right through for 12 hours – what a brilliant day!

Clevedon were athletic and had a natural desire to intercept the ball and reach in to dispossess the SK boys and it took the first period of the game for the boys to adjust their performance accordingly. During the first period the boys made the contest a lot more difficult for themselves by dribbling the ball too much and ignoring the fact that there were players free ahead of them. When the boys eventually recognised this they were able to work a number of good shooting opportunities unopposed. In fact they did exactly that with those boys scoring 10 points between them.

Despite the boys working out what they needed to do offensively they did struggle to get their defense sorted. One particular passage of play left those on the side (including me) with their head in the hands. The boys pressed high up the court for a Clevedon inbound leaving Clevedon's tallest player open for a long pass which he duly accepted and knocked in for an easy 2! As bad as that particular passage of play was, the majority of their hustle off of the ball was good and they intercepted a number of passes which presented them with good scoring opportunities of their own.

In the second period of the game SK had started to put it together and took their lead out to double figures but in the third period the boys let their lead slip a little and found themselves in a close contest for the fourth and final period of the game. When basketball matches are close you always look to your big players to come up with the goods. Ben Lumoso is big in stature, character and work rate and was already having a serious impact on the game up until this point. In the

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final period of the game when the scores were close, Ben really stepped up and handled the ball in pressured situations to see his team through. After arriving at our overnight stop we left the minibus and luggage behind and headed for the underground station at Mile

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

After a short walk from Stratford Station we arrived at the Olympic Park and had plenty of time to take a tour of some of the iconic sights from the London Olympic Games in 2012. We had a fantastic afternoon walking around the park and visiting some of the venues that we had all watched so eagerly on television 6 years ago! We visited the Aquatic Centre, Wall of Champions, the Agitos symbol, the VeloPark, the Olympic Rings, the Slide and of course the Olympic Stadium itself! It was amazing to wander through the park and to take in all of the sights and sounds that were on offer. There are so many details you just couldn't see everything – around every corner there was something different to see; whether it was Greg Rutherford's winning long jump marked out on the ground or a brave soul abseiling down the side of the formidable looking Slide!





Later in the evening we entered the London Stadium to take our seats in the most amazing arena! Our seats were fantastic – we were right down the front, seated right next to the entrance tunnel, just below the live band and had a brilliant view of the start / finish line as well as the shot, javelin and discus/hammer cage! We'd been in the stadium for a matter of minutes before the group spotted their first celebrity – Caolán managed a quick photograph!




Things were exciting enough before the athletics had even started let alone once the competition was underway! I have never been to watch live athletics before and absolutely loved the fact that you didn't know where to turn because there was so much to watch! All of a sudden you would hear a roar from one part of the ground and look over to see someone jumping, then someone would prepare to throw right in front of us and all the time events were setting off around the track!

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The atmosphere was superb and things really built into the evening as the lights in the stadium started to become more and more dominant. We had so many treats all in the space of a few short hours; our own Sophie Hitchon up against the women's world record holder for the hammer right in front of us, Holly Bradshaw winning the pole vault, Lorraine Ugen smashing the long jump, Nesta Carter running on the track and the drama of the men's 4 x 100m relay to finish!



As we walked out of the stadium and made our way back to Queen Mary University at Mile End you couldn't help but think how lucky you had been on the evening but what made it even more special was that there was still another whole day of live sporting action to come!

The overnight stay gave the students a great opportunity to experience what life might be like in University halls and while the group might have complained about the 0830 start to the day, they weren't moaning too much when they made it in for breakfast in The Curve – one of the campus' canteens.

A quick hop from East to West across London gave the group chance to take in some more sights before finally parking up at Wimbledon Park Golf Club opposite one of the most iconic sporting venues in the world and home to the most prestigious tennis tournament that there is! We were lucky enough to have 5 pairs of tickets for Court 1 and 1 pair of tickets for Centre Court. We rotated students on and off centre court all day with the intention of allowing everyone to see some of the 2018 Men's Final – unfortunately the game didn't go on for quite as long as we would have liked. Everyone got an opportunity to get on Centre Court to see one of the two finals that were scheduled for the day. The group weren't short of tennis to watch on Number 1 either and arguably that court had the best days play. First up we watched a young Brit by the name of Jack Draper go down narrowly in the Boys Singles Final. This was followed by a Ladies and then Gentlemen's Invitational Doubles where we got to see Martina Navratilova and Kim Clijsters as well as Mark Philippoussis and Xavier Malisse.

When you walk around at The Championships you have to keep your eyes open, especially on finals day! Tom and Danny have a bit of a reputation for celebrity spotting and both boys managed to get photos with some rather well known footballers! 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

With the 2017/18 competition complete was can announce that for the second year running there are 91% of students in years 7-10 who have represented their houses in at least one sporting competition!


