Term 6 has been a term full of events and celebrations as we have recognised students' effort, progress and achievement from the year. Students and staff are embracing our values of respect, responsibility, resilience, honesty, acceptance, equality, determination and friendship. These have been showcased this week by a group of students who produced 'Half Full', their very own musical. More on this later.

In early July we welcomed Year 6 students from over 50 primary schools who will be joining us in September. It was great to see their enthusiasm during their two day induction and the warm welcome they received from our current students. The Year 6s experienced a full range of lessons and grew in confidence in their new surroundings which will help them hit the ground running in September. We ended the induction with an evening BBQ for the students and their parents and carers who enjoyed locally sourced food.

Every day a huge amount of talent and potential arrives at the St Katherine's School gates. The many celebratory events in Term 6 gives us the opportunity to recognise and appreciate this talent, along with the effort, progress and achievements of our students across all aspects of school life.

Our 'Celebration of Achievement' Year Group events were very well received by staff and students and highlighted some great successes and well-earned recognition. The warmth of reception that each and every student received was a proud moment for me and reflected a great sense of community and appreciation. These culminated in the 'Best of the Best 'event, another successful evening with many proud students, parents/carers, teachers and an exceptionally proud Head of School at the end of his first year.

After a painful wait of four years, yes four years, we finally enjoyed the most fantastic sports day three weeks ago. Maybe it was the wait, maybe it was the students, maybe it was the PE department or maybe it was all three. The atmosphere was carnival like with impromptu face painting, music and running commentary provided by Mr Thomas and Mr Hodgson. The races ran like clock work and the students supported from their house pens. Records were broken and Saturn stole the glory, only just, by beating Mars by the tightest of margins. We will have a sports day every year and next year's will be bigger and even better.

Some of the highlights from this term include:

Our Year 10s did work experience with a variety of businesses and organisations. One lucky group
spent the week with Avon and Somerset Police which included a day at Trinity Road police station,
spending time with the police communications and firearms training units, visiting the custody suite and
horse and dog sections, and meeting the Police and Crime Commissioner. Work experience with the
Police is very rare and highly sought after so thanks to Emily Robinson and the Avon and Somerset
Black Police Association for arranging a memorable, inspiring week.

- While Year 10s were on work experience, Years 7,8 and 9 enjoyed Activities Week. A group of Year 7 and 8 pupils visited Paris while a group of Year 9s went to Barcelona. Back on home turf students enjoyed numerous day trips including plus activities on site including a masterclass with a comic artist from the Beano, Masterchef in the training kitchen and a visit by North Somerset Bird of Prey Centre who brought raccoons, weasels, chameleons, lizards, a Barn Owl called Cherish and a snake called Slick.
- We have had two student trips to the Houses of Parliament this term. In June, Year 7,8 and 9 students visited the Commons chamber then formed their own parties and debated issues such as gender equality and tuition fees as part of a democracy workshop. Their appetite to debate the issues that affect them and the world around them was impressive.
- St Katherine's Music Parent Supporters (SKAMPS) celebrated their 20th anniversary with a great evening of live music performed by over thirty of the school's fine young musicians and the Pill Festival Band. There was a wide variety of music, performed by soloists and instrumental groups whose efforts raised £500 that will go towards instruments and and music workshops for students.
- Year 10 Geographers spent three days of fieldwork study at Nettlecombe in Somerset which included fluvial fieldwork measuring width, depth and velocity of riverflows. They also did human fieldwork in Taunton looking at social inequalities which involved environmental quality surveys, anti-crime surveys and vehicle surveys.

In September last year, Will Want wrote a creative response to a book called Wolf Brother and, on the strength of this work, Mrs Jefferson encouraged him to write an original musical with a student cast. After a couple of false starts, Will developed an idea for a play based on the themes of solidarity and pride with a storyline about people putting aside differences and prejudices to be friends. With help from Wren Talbot-Ponsonby and Angel Galloway, Will wrote the script, gathered a cast of students from Years 7 - 10 and began rehearsals. As well as writing the play Will oversaw the production, set, props, costumes and organised a supporting band. The production has been staged this week and been very positively received by students and staff. Congratulations to Will and all the cast and band for creating a striking, thought-provoking production.
