As part of our continuing drive to improve reading standards across the school and create a powerful culture of reading, we use a programme called Accelerated Reader with all our year 7 & 8 students. This personalised scheme challenges students to read books that are suited to their individual reading ability, whilst giving school staff flexible tools to support, manage & monitor this. The ultimate aim is to see reading growth for each and every student, regardless of their individual ability. All the research into the area of young people's reading clearly shows the lasting and lifelong benefits of regularly reading for pleasure, across all subjects, and this scheme really helps us to embed this with our students.



Every day is Drop Everything and Read day at St Katherine's! For 20 minutes every afternoon students and staff enjoy quiet time to get lost in their latest book. You can help your child by reminding them to have their book in their bag every day. Ask them to tell you about their book, and perhaps read some of it together.

Kwame Alexander 'The Crossover'

12-year-old Josh and his twin Jordan have basketball in their blood. They're kings of the court, star players for their school team. Their father used to be a champion player and they each want nothing more than to follow in his footsteps. A fantastic story told through poetry.

Robin Stevens 'The Guggenheim Mystery'

Following on from 'The London Eye Mystery' Ted, Kat and Salim return to solve another bafflingly brilliant puzzle.



Jonathan Stroud 'The Screaming Staircase'

Lockwood and Co, a psychic agency fighting an epidemic of ghosts, spend the night in one of England's most haunted houses. Will they make it out alive?

Sarah Crossan 'The Weight of Water'

A St Kaths favourite! Kasienka and her mother come to England to try to find her missing father. Life at home is tough, and school friends are scarce, but someone special shows her there might be more than one way to stay afloat. Beautifully told through poetry.





Chris Vick 'Girl, Boy, Sea'

A British boy narrowly survives the sinking of his yacht in a huge storm off the coast of Morocco. After days alone at sea in a tiny rowing boat Bill rescues a girl clinging for her life to a barrel.
