COURSE OUTLINE

HISTORY - A LEVEL





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The A level history comprises four units: Paper 1: the later Tudors, Paper 2: Germany democracy and dictatorships 1919-1963, Paper 3: civil rights in America 1865-1992 as well as an independent study. In Year 12 students will hone their source skills examining the challenges facing the later Tudor monarchs: Edward, Mary and Elizabeth. In contrast to this they will consider Germany's transition through democracy to dictatorship and the external events which influenced the course of this period of history. In Year 13, students will have the opportunity to select an independent study topic of their choice to research and investigate. Alongside this students will also learn of the struggle of four key groups to gain freedom and equal rights in America from the end of the American Civil War to the early 1990s.
